## Vice - President's Notes

Our club, thanks mainly to the effort of Tom Bennett, will have a booth at the October 29th Northwest Computer Swap meet at the San Mateo County Fair Grounds. We will be signing up new members and providing a source of information about the swap meet for you. Atari is expected to take part in our effort. Read more about the results next month

Our club has been in existence for 9 months now (since February) so some memberships are running out. Your membership expiration date is being printed on the mailing label for this newsletter. Your membership priveledges (floppies, newsletter, etc.) will go away if you don't stay current on your dues. See Nai Hsien Mao, our Treasurer November 1st.

Our club owns quite a bit of commercial software. We've been doing a lot of thinking about how to easily make this software available for you to check out. 3 E Software in Haward (Kim Ellison) has volunteered to handle the paperwork and be a central location for this effort. So that we could get this project going the following arrangements have been made: Choose the software that you want to check out, Present your SLCC membership card to 3E and sign a charge slip for the retail value of the software. This charge slip will not be put thru unless you don't return the software within the rental period of 3 days. When you return the items, a donation to the club of 5% for games and 10% for business software will be required. (and your charge slip will be torn up). The donation is about half of what most software rental houses charge. You must be a member of the San Leandro Computer Club in order to check out any of the software. Kim will encourage (and accept) new memberships.

Handling the checking out of our commercial software is a little tricky. We must make the software easily available and we must assure that nobody forgets to bring their software back. Restricting the time allows any one item to be borrowed 10 times a month. If any of you have commercial software you would like to donate to the club we would really appreciate it. Doing so will also allow you a free rental. A few of the selections are: Micropainter, Basic Compiler, Filemanager Plus, Text Wizard, Canyon Climer and a bunch of games.

8:07 Meeting called to order by Vice-President Bill George. New members asked to introduce themselves and describe their systems

8:10 Introduction of Officers - explanation of club membership policy

8:15 Treasurers report given by Nai-Shen Mao disclosed total assets of \$500 cash in the club account, and approx. 50 blank diskettes

8:20 Tom Bennett introduces Gary Furr representing Data Soft Inc. Mr. Furr gave a candid and interesting discussion on a wide range of subjects from the last great days at Atari Inc. to the condition of the software industry today.

Demonstrations of the following games were given: O'RILEY'S MINE, SANDS OF EGYPT, POOYAN, AND MOON SHUTTLE. These were then donated to the club library, along with copies of TEXT WIZARD, TELE-TALK, COLOR PRINT, AND SHOOTING GALLERY. A demonstration of Data Soft's new word processor "LETTER WIZARD" was also given.

The following Q & A session revealed many interesting bits of news and gossip; Watch for future disks to contain Atari programs on one side and the exact same program for Commodore on the other, with Apple and IBM programs to be packaged the same way; Watch for new software lines offering BOTH a disk AND a cassette in the same box, starting at less than \$20. ( he donated one ); watch for a possible special discount on LETTER WIZARD offered to registered owners of TEXT WIZARD ( it should come in the mail ).

9:50 Disk Librarian Trey Pitruzzello describes this month's Floppy offered for sale at the meeting. Cassette Librarian Dan Chun announced the addition of 4 new programs to the tape collection available for rent to the membership.

## THE NEXT MEETING

If you missed last month's meeting, you missed some very interesting comments by Mr. Gary Furr of Datasoft. As the meeting was coming to a close, Mr. Furr was making some ominous statements about the general health of ATARI and their hardware business. Statements like there being a question whether ATARI will be in the hardware business much longer, and general comments to the effect that an inept management is holding back product development had the club very silent. He was attacking the ATARI, making us all wonder if we'll be seeing the promised new products, or whether we will be receiving future support from the many software companies should the hardware line be dropped.

He is talking from an insider's viewpoint, and perhaps a disastrous holiday season in 1983 will be the beginning of the end for ATARI. But I think it will be difficult to put our computers to bed with the many companies developing products for ATARI computers. And there are many machines out there now supported by groups like the San Leandro Computer Club that would continue to go on with or without ATARI.

Gary was very generous to the club by donating a number of programs to the club library. They included copies of Text Wizard, Datasoft's Basic Compiler, Pooyan, and others. I think this type of generosity deserves acknowledgement and our support of future products.

Due to a conflict in scheduling, the ATARI User's Group Support team of Earl Rice and Marc Cator had to cancel for November's meeting. But Dave Maynard, the author of Worms?, has agreed to speak at our next meeting instead of December. And

Marc Cator of ATARI has agreed (tentatively) to speak at our December meeting.

Dave Maynard will introduce us to some of the highly acclaimed products of Electronic Arts like Dave's Worms?, Bill Budge's Pinball Construction Set, Archon, and some previews of new products of EA. I think you will be impressed by the quality and the originality of the product line. (Remember that the November meeting is the first day of the month!)

ET CETERA: I wrote of a new "E" Rom for the 810 disk drive in last month's newsletter, and Gary Furr confirmed that he had heard of such a chip. He thought that the "E" Rom was a modification that allowed certain programs to be easily copied. San Jose T.V., an ATARI sales and service store, said that they thought it allowed additional programs to be copied with SuperDup. They felt they could get us the Roms, but they felt the Happy Enhancement to be a much better product. Should this be the true function of the upgrade, I wouldn't expect ATARI to release it. Gary added that he felt it would not be released because the 810 has been discontinued for the 1050 Disk Drive. "The 810 is dead", he stated.

Nap Forte, a member of the SLCC, gave me a call the other day and was interested in placing an 800 keyboard on his 400. He got a bargain at the Hayward Flea Market on an 800 keyboard, and wondered if anyone in the club could give him a hand in adding the keyboard. I looked up an article that ran in an issue of the San Diego ACE newsletter that described just how to do such project. I have submitted the article to our newsletter, and if it shouldn't get published, let me know whether you would be interested in

such an article, and I'll make you a copy. The keyboard will not fit on the 400 casing, but I've seen some nice external keyboards similar to the IBM PC concept running on ATARI 400's. Nat said he has installed a 64K board in his 400, and would be willing to help others on such a modification.

This brings me to my final topic: the Hardware SIG. I am sure that there are members of the club with interests and perhaps expertise in ATARI hardware. And I know there are club members with CTIA's that would like a GTIA installed, and those that have the "A" Rom that would like to upgrade their OS to a "B" Rom. (Type in the Basic statement PRINT PEEK(58383), hit return, and if the answer is 56, you have the old "A" Rom.) Should you be interested in a Hardware SIG, or would like some help from such a SIG, contact me at the next meeting or call me at 276-4466. I am only a novice in hardware, but there are people in the group that know the ATARI system, so why not share your knowledge with other members of the group?
